



Hamamelis x intermedia (witch hazel) is a cross between Hamamelis japonica and Hamamelis mollis, which was developed around 1935, at more or less the same time in the Arnold Arboretum, the United States, the Charlottenlund Botanic Gardens, Denmark, the Kalmthout Arboretum, Belgium and by Heinrich Bruns, Germany. Both parents contribute to the ornamental value of this witch hazel: a rich blossom with relatively large flowers that produce a pleasant fragrance. The slowly growing shrub has a vase-shaped habit and can develop to be four metres tall and wide. There are many different cultivars available, which have a variety of flower colours and autumn colouring.

Hamamelis x intermedia is an eye-catcher in the winter, when the delicate, yellow flowers open. The flowers curl up in cold and harsh weather, but do not freeze. The summer leaves on this witch hazel are large and dark green, in this season, the species does not have a striking appearance. But, in the autumn, the shrub is an eye-catcher once again, with leaves that turn a deep orange-red.

Hamamelis x intermedia prefers to be planted in a sunny location, sheltered from the wind, in an open, moist and acidic soil, rich in nutrients. For the first year after planting, a Hamamelis must absolutely not be allowed to dry out. Place the shrub in a solitary place, possibly with low shrubs or perennials at its foot. The witch hazel can be pruned to a very limited extent after the blossom in March. You should mainly prune the rising shoots from the rootstock and the dead wood. If further pruning is necessary, only prune twigs that are the thickness of a pencil.
